There was an eternity when our physical reality did not exist. There was only a spiritual reality that was without any distinctive size and it existed in timelessness. It was and still is the essence of our creator.

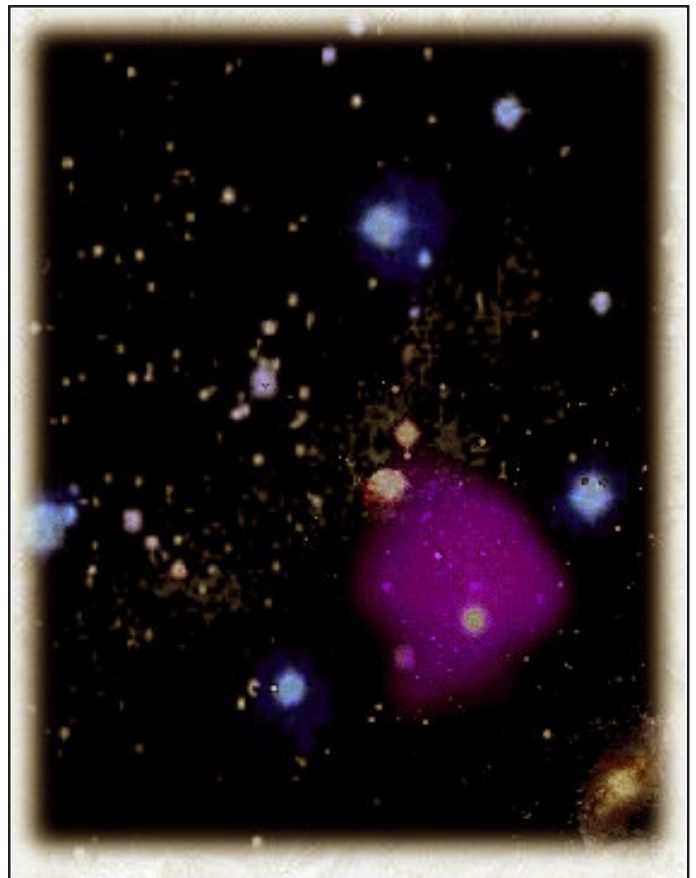
